Orphanage Update Buy A Block

As you know this is one of the key projects at the orphanage; building a wall to enclose and secure the property. Before we took over the children's home,

been cracking on with the building works and around 2/3 of the perimeter is now secure. In August we had to cut down around 50 trees that lay on the

local people had become very accustomed to using our land as a shortcut and helping themselves to anything they wanted from the property, something that continues to happen even though we are now firmly in residence. Obviously there is a risk to the children's safety too if strangers can just come and go undeterred.

The plan is to build a 4 foot high brick block fence and then add another two feet of security mesh to the top of the fence.

Introducing Kenny....

Continuing on the theme of security we were delighted to welcome a new member to the orphanage family. Kenny our German shepherd puppy is now 4 months old and when he's fully grown will patrol the property at night.

At the moment the children are having great fun playing with our new bundle of fun; we just need to remember not to leave shoes within his reach as he is chewing everything in sight!

Meet Charmara and Tharaka

The youngest child at the orphanage is 6 year old Tharaka who came to the orphanage with his elder brother Charmara who is now 10.

When Tharaka was only 3 months old his mother left the children in the "care" of their elderly grandmother and an alcoholic father who used to beat the boys when he was drunk, almost a daily occurrence.

The children were finally rescued by Sri Lankan Child Protection Services 6 months ago when the people in their village, from whom they had been scavenging food, reported them to the authorities.

Both boys were severely malnourished when they arrived with the distended stomachs you probably associate more with images of child starvation in sub-Saharan Africa.

Charmara used to gobble up food so quickly at mealtimes that he would often make himself sick and Tharaka's development has been so stunted that although he is 6 he's the height of a 3 year old and still only weighs 10kg.

It's hard to imagine their earlier lives when you see them now.



This is Charmara on his 10th birthday where we celebrated with a snakes and ladders cake.



Tharaka is the most gorgeous, affectionate and happy little boy who spends most of his days either sweeping leaves into piles while singing to himself or pretending to drive an invisible car.



He's looking forward to going to school next year although that will be a challenge for the teachers as he has a "colourful" vocabulary, copied from his father.



Orphanage Update continued...

Balangoda...



The excitement was at fever pitch when we told the children we were going to spend a few days at the Balangoda agricultural project in August.

The van was packed to the gunnels with essential building supplies, bags of rice, and eggs from the ever productive hens at the orphanage as well as our own bedding and luggage. We broke the 5 hour journey at Ratnapura where we ate our lunch packets and visited a gem museum and pulled in to the Balangoda property as the sun was going down.



We immediately noticed the difference in climate - much cooler and drier - and by the time we had unpacked the van, sorted out the

sleeping arrangements and had dinner we were exhausted and ready to hit the hay. The children and the carers (Duthika, and Chalani) were all sleeping on the floor in one room while Olivia and I had the luxury of mattresses on the floor in the room next door.

Next morning, the children were up bright and early and we headed out to explore the surroundings, climbing up the mountain to get a great view over the property where



we could see how much progress has been made in reclaiming the land from the jungle and planting fruit and vegetables.

From our vantage point we could also see a lake in the distance which we visited later in the day.



Some of the children had come from the Balangoda area originally and so their families had been invited to come to lunch the next day to spend some time with them in a safe environment. Duthika and Chalani pulled out all the stops in preparing a feast and a pleasant afternoon was had by all. The van was called into

use again as a taxi afterwards when Olivia drove our guests back in to the town... 23 people in a 12 seater van!

A visitor's view....

My name is Sue Jasper and I spent a few weeks at the orphanage in August this year.

I'd visited Sri Lanka several times since my first visit in 1982 so when

I was made redundant from my job as a project manager working for an insurance company in the UK I grasped the opportunity to do something completely different and searched the internet for a charity in Sri Lanka where I could do some voluntary work for a few weeks prior to my husband coming out to join me for a holiday.

I found the Kathleen Keegel Children's Fund immediately (boy, I love the internet) and after a brief exchange of emails with Georgiana initially and then Olivia I found myself in Hewadiwela a couple of weeks later.



teaching the carers how to bake bread, cakes, pastries and pizza and generally helping out with keeping the children occupied and amused. When my husband came to join me in Sri Lanka we took the children to the nearby elephant orphanage for the morning which was great fun.

It's clear to see that the children are thriving under Olivia and Fred's guardianship.

When they are not at school they have a timetable of arts/crafts sport,



religion and English language activities.

The cricket pitch is very popular, but you do have to watch out for snakes, and I've never ever seen kids so happy to do chores like gardening and sweeping leaves.



While I was there I taught English, (something I hadn't done since the early eighties!); spent some time
